



## Seminary celebrates historic trilingual commencement

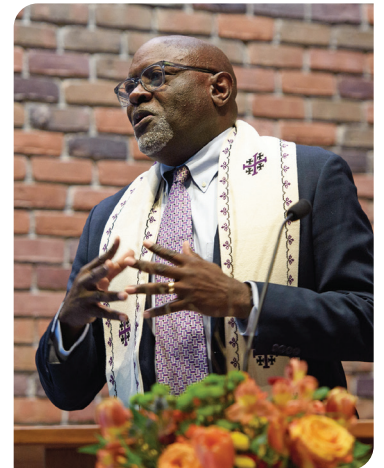
Approximately 200 people took part in a joyous and historic Commencement Service on May 2 in AMBS's Chapel of the Sermon on the Mount, including 16 of the 26 members of the Class of 2026. The event, which was also accessible via livestream, marked multiple milestones for the seminary:

- Two students were the first to earn a **Doctor of Ministry in Leadership** through a program that launched in January 2023.
- Ten students were the first to complete the fully online **Spanish-language Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies** program that began in August 2023 through a partnership between AMBS and Hispanic Ministries of Mennonite Church USA. Each student who began the program completed it.
- Eight of nine students who are part of a **Korean-language Master of Arts: Theology and Global Anabaptism** cohort traveled from South Korea to participate in the event and were recognized in advance of completing their degrees in 2027. Their customized program, which focuses on Anabaptist peace studies, began in 2022 through a partnership between AMBS and the Nehemiah Institute for Christian Studies in Seoul. It also has seen 100-percent retention.

- This was the first Commencement Service in the seminary's history to be presented trilingually — with simultaneous translation from English into Korean and Spanish, some program elements presented in all three languages, and printed programs available in each language — to honor the students who were completing their studies entirely in Korean or Spanish.

"This year's Graduation Weekend felt historic in many ways as we recognized graduates of three new programs created to meet needs across the church," reflected **David Boshart**, PhD, President. "What made this experience most meaningful, though, was the remarkable perseverance and transformation represented by each student's journey. Their stories are ones of courage, calling, spiritual growth and deep commitment to serving the church. Our faculty and staff have been privileged to witness the profound ways these students have been shaped as leaders, scholars and faithful followers of Jesus."

## First cohort completes Spanish-language Graduate Certificate program

Ten students were part of the first cohort to complete the fully online **Spanish-language Graduate Certificate in Theological Studies** program that began in August 2023 through a partnership between AMBS and Hispanic Ministries of Mennonite Church USA. Seven of them received their certificates in person at the May 2 Commencement Service.

The 21-credit-hour program is taught entirely in Spanish and is designed to provide professionals, congregational leaders and bivocational pastors with a foundation in theological and biblical study, spiritual enrichment, and fuller integration of theological studies into their work and ministry. Students in the program take seven three-credit-hour courses over two and a half years, with one course each semester and one in the summer.

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Church Development for Everence, encouraged the graduates to pay attention to God's call in the "small beginnings" in their lives and ministries. After naming present-day challenges, he referenced theologian Walter Brueggemann's idea that individuals, organizations and communities can find themselves in one of three places: orientation, disorientation and reorientation.

For wisdom in this season of disorientation, he turned to Zechariah 4:10: "Do not despise

these small beginnings, for the Lord rejoices to see the work begin, to see the plumb line in Zerubbabel's hand."

These words came at a time when God's people were experiencing destruction and despair, fearing that God had abandoned them, Dow said. In the biblical story, Zerubbabel took a risk by God's grace and the Spirit's movement and began to rebuild the foundation of the temple that had been destroyed.

"We find that a brother, a man of God in his community, said, 'No, we now need to begin thinking about rebuilding, re-establishing, re-engaging, restoring,'" he told the graduates. "It's

vital in our season of disorientation that leaders such as yourselves are in step with the Spirit and open to noticing the small things that are seemingly insignificant occurrences. By God's grace it is being revealed that something else is coming."

Dow cited Bible stories in which the kingdom of God was revealed in small things and shared about times in his own ministry when God did something new in a season of disorientation, beginning with a small act. His work with Everence has included embracing small beginnings in the form of opening a credit union in a historically under-resourced community in Philadelphia.

When people learn not to despise small beginnings, he concluded, they can learn to wait on the Lord, to let go of expectations, to hold on to one another and to allow God to transform them.

After the graduates received their diplomas, **Jackie Wyse-Rhodes**, PhD, Associate Professor of Hebrew Bible, gave them a blessing: "Rest assured that you have what you need to step forward into your vocation. Rest assured that you are beloved, you are enough, and you are never alone."

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## AMBS celebrates first DMin graduates

Johnson presented her professional doctoral dissertation — “Healing after the Shame of Difficult Ministry Endings” — at AMBS and via Zoom on Jan. 29. Rissler presented his dissertation — “How Faith-Adjacent People Experience Spirituality in Wild Church” — at Atlanta (Georgia) Mennonite Church and via Zoom on March 4.

“Both of these first two DMin presentations beautifully illustrated the academic rigor and pastoral heart that define AMBS,” said **Jewel Gingerich Longenecker**, PhD, DMin Program Director. “While thoroughly researched, these projects aren’t just academic exercises; they represent vital, transformative work that speaks directly to the challenges and opportunities facing the church today.”

AMBS's 32-credit-hour Doctor of Ministry — a competency-based program deliberately developed with an Anabaptist framework — is designed to help ministry professionals strengthen their leadership capacities by building on what they've learned in their prior studies and leadership roles.

Students complete online coursework while based in their professional ministry or leadership context, coming to AMBS each January for a week of intensive in-person class sessions. Each student is part of a cohort and has a faculty mentor and an advisory ministry group to guide their studies. They can complete the program in as few as three years and as many as six years.

The students traveled from South Korea to participate in the Graduation Weekend activities and were recognized in advance of completing their degrees in 2027.

Their customized program began in 2022 through a partnership between AMBS and the Nehemiah Institute for Christian Studies (NICS) in Seoul. NICS leaders who knew Anabaptist leaders in South Korea (including some AMBS alumni) initiated the partnership. The course materials are
